- 128. Wisconsin Masonic Charities can be supported through donor charitable remainder annuity trusts or a charitable remainder Unitrust.
- 129. The High School Scholarship program allows Wisconsin Masonic Lodges to contribute to the Wisconsin Masonic Foundation General Fund.
- 130. Masonic charity has helped to build a medical facility connected with the Good Samaritan Hospital group.
- 131. The Masonic Diagnostic and Treatment Center is open only to Masons and their families.
- 132. Each Lodge is encouraged to maintain a functional charity fund.
- 133. Fund raisers may be used to add monies to local lodge charity funds.
- 134. Lodges may not contribute to local, community or other non-Masonic charities.
- 135. The Charity Growth Goal of the Wisconsin Masonic Foundation is 15 million dollars by the year 2000.
- 136. Tax benefits can be gained through a variety of donations and contributions individually given to Masonic charities.
- 137. The Charity Committee is a standing committee of every lodge.
- 138. Cash is the most popular form of charitable giving.
- 139. Masonry is one of the great religions of the world.
- 140. Lodges where there is no one who is available to present a Masonic Memorial Service, either the District Chaplain or the Grand Chaplain may be called on.
- 141. The term “Charge” in Masonry refers to a responsibility or duty.
- 142. The first comprehensive “Charges of a Freemason” were published in 1823 by Dr. James Anderson.
- 143. Most often Masons hear the “Charge” as it is read to a degree candidate at the close of a degree.
- 144. The Ancient Landmarks of Freemasonry can be, from time to time, altered and changed.
- 145. The Constitution of the Grand Lodge has authority over the “Ancient Landmarks.”
- 146. The Wisconsin Grand Lodge accepts the concept of Ancient Landmarks but has not agreed on how many there are.
- 147. The Wisconsin Grand Lodge recognizes 25 Landmarks after Albert Mackey, 7 of Roscoe Pound and has officially adopted them.
- 148. All Grand Lodges throughout the United States recognize the same specific “Landmarks.”
- 149. Landmarks of Freemasonry cannot be changed or taken away from Freemasonry without changing Freemasonry into something else.
- 150. One of the standing committees of the Grand Lodge is the Committee on Masonic Education.
- 151. The Short Talk Bulletin is an educational journal available from the Masonic Service Association.
- 152. A subscription fee must be paid to obtain individual copies of the Short Talk Bulletin.
- 153. Masonic information films are on loan from the Grand Lodge for small rental fees.
- 154. Research Lodges compile a great deal of Masonic information.
- 155. The closest Research Lodge to Wisconsin is Quatuor Coronati Lodge 2076.
- 156. It is recommended that Lodge officers obtain periodicals from other Masonic Bodies and jurisdictions.
- 157. Masons may visit Lodges in other Grand Jurisdictions which are recognized by our Grand Lodge.
- 158. The Master of a Lodge must admit all qualified Masons into his Lodge.
- 159. One of the standing committees of our Grand Lodge is the Committee on Foreign Relations.
- 160. There is only one Grand Lodge in Canada recognized by the Grand Lodge of Wisconsin.
- 161. Pantagraph’s “List of Lodges - Masonic” lists all Regular Masonic Lodges of the United States.
- 162. The roots of Wisconsin Masonry first took form in the year 1723.

- 163. The Grand Lodge of New York issued the dispensation for the organization of Wisconsin's first Lodge.
- 164. When Wisconsin Masonry developed, the State of Wisconsin was then a part of the territory of Michigan.
- 165. Menomanie Lodge, which traces its history back to the early 1800's, is still in existence.
- 166. The army unit at Fort Howard and the miners in the extreme southwest part of the State of Wisconsin influenced the early development of Wisconsin Lodges.
- 167. The Lodge which was given the dispensation of #1 was Mineral Point Lodge.
- 168. The first two Lodges in the extreme southwest part of Wisconsin were chartered through the Grand Lodge of New York.
- 169. The first Grand Master of Masons in Wisconsin was Benjamin T. Kavanaugh.
- 170. Lodge #3, Kilbourn Lodge, was chartered by the Grand Lodge of Illinois.
- 171. Benjamin Franklin printed the first Masonic book in North America titled: Three Distinct Knocks.
- 172. Any person who willfully wears any Masonic insignia or emblem, and is not entitled to do so, may be fined.
- 173. Lodges may elect less than three trustees to take care of the Lodge's real and personal property.
- 174. Lodge trustees may not be sued, in the Lodge's name, in matters pertaining to the business of the trustees.
- 175. All activities of the trustees must be accomplished under the supervision of the Master, who is ultimately responsible for all Lodge activities.
- 176. Trustees may invest funds in securities if proper discretion is followed.
- 177. Raffles are not permitted in Masonic buildings or upon their grounds.
- 178. Activities and programs of Masonic Lodges should not be considered news items in communities as the Fraternity is a Secret Society.
- 179. Internal publications on a regular basis will help to keep all Lodge members informed and are highly recommended.
- 180. The Grand Lodge website is maintained only for the Grand Lodge Officers.
- 181. Each Master Mason in Wisconsin should be receiving the official Grand Lodge publication.
- 182. Advertising in the Grand Lodge's publication is acceptable except for cigarette or liquor items.
- 183. Complimentary mailings of the Masonic Journal are sent to widows of Masons upon request.
- 184. A good press release is written to give the news quickly and completely.
- 185. When preparing a news story it should stand as "literature for the ages."
- 186. Titles such as Wardens, Deacons and Tilers are common knowledge to the general public.
- 187. In writing a news release the most important sentence should be at the end of the paragraph.
- 188. When writing for the public use conversational tones and avoid technical language.
- 189. All news copy should be single-spaced, typewritten using generous margins.
- 190. The Masonic Exhibit Booth is suitable for local community fairs.
- 191. The Grand Lodge office furnishes copies of the Directory of Lodges, Masters, Wardens and Secretaries to each individual Lodge.
- 192. When a member purchases a Perpetual Membership Plan (PMP) the Lodge receives annual payments, even after the member's death.
- 193. A Perpetual Membership Plan may be purchased through installments.
- 194. A Perpetual Membership Plan may be transferred only if both Lodges consent to such transfer.
- 195. A participant in the PMP is relieved of any liability for special assessments by both his own Lodge and the Grand Lodge.
- 196. Freemasonry is second only to the Odd Fellows in age and size of a fraternity.

- 197. As of 1991 there were eight Grand Jurisdictions, including Wisconsin that extended recognition to Prince Hall Freemasonry.
- 198. Prince Hall Freemasonry's ethnic make-up is predominately Black.
- 199. The first Black Lodge was organized in 1876, in Boston, as African Lodge No.1.
- 200. After Prince Hall's death, the African Grand Lodge was renamed the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge F. & A.M. in his honor.
